II. New Testament Definitions:

- 1. Age: a phase in the Divine program during which the Three Persons reveal aspects of their character to created beings. This may be by comparison or contrast. Ages existed before time into Eternity-Past and will continue in Eternity-Future (Eph. 2:7; 3:21; Heb. 1:2; 11:3 *cf.* Gal.1:4).
- 2. Dispensation: a unique period during which God imposes regulations on some or all of mankind. Dispensationalism is a product of literal interpretation. The term "dispensation" is used 9 times. Three Dispensations are named.
 - 1) Promise (Acts 7:17)
 - 2) Grace (Eph. 3:2)
 - 3) Fullness of the Times (Eph. 1:10)

- 3. The Bible—the written revelation from God to man, is progressive in nature; the revelation beginnings through Moses and ends is with the Apostle John. As God reveals more about Himself, He sometimes changes how He deals with mankind. For example God changes dietary standards in different times.
 - 1) Adam to Noah—vegetarian (Gen. 2:16; 9:3)
 - 2) Noah to Moses—eat anything, except blood (Gen. 9:3)
 - 3) Moses to Pentecost—highly restricted diet which included some meats (Lev. 11:1-47)
 - 4) Pentecost to Tribulation—eat anything (1 Tim. 4:4)
 - 5) During the Tribulation, the restricted diet of the Law is reinstituted (Lev. 11:1-7)
 - 6) Kingdom/Millennium, vegetarian (Is. 25:22-25)
 - 7) Eternity, no diet needed (Rev. 22:1-2)
